Marlee Matlin received the 2,383rd star on Hollywood Boulevard and



Vine Street, honouring an extensive television and movie career, including being the youngest winner of the best actress Academy Award.

The actress, who won the Academy Award and Golden Globe for Best Actress for her role in Children of a Lesser God, welled up as Henry Winkler read a poem she wrote when she was 12 about how she wanted to be an actress.

She said through a sign-language interpreter, "I really am humbled to be here today with all of

you on this magnificent street of dreams, the Hollywood Walk of Fame."

Marlee, 43, who lives in Los Angeles with her husband and four children, has also been nominated for Emmy Awards for her performances in Seinfeld, Picket Fences, The Practice, and Law & Order. She is the author of Deaf Child Crossing.

My Almost Famous Family – We've Only Just Begun – Episode 1 (12 September 2009)

A deaf character in its major new series **My** almost Famous Family, a comedy drama about a musical family who sing together in a television pop group.

Deaf Parenting UK worked with the researcher, sought high and low to find a young child actress to play 'Martha' with BSL and have experiences of having Deaf parents/families for the programme.

An executive producer of the programme, confirmed that a child has been found and is a perfect for the character. And the name of the child is Rachel Brady.

vear old Martha was to be deaf.

How would a deaf character interact in the everyday lives of a musical family and overcome the odds that would pose?".

"I hadn't done any acting before, this was my very first time," reveals Rachel, who loves English and science at school. "I'd always wanted to act."

So how did Rachel get the part of Martha, who is deaf?

"My sign language teacher told me about it, so I sent off a DVD audition – and they chose me," explains Rachel. "Then I went and did an audition, which was quite scary, and they chose me again!"

So what's Martha like?

"Martha is the one who sorts out all the problems," giggles Rachel.

"She's funny and sometimes bosses the others around. I would like to be like her as she's fantastic! I got to wear very nice clothes as Martha – if there's a party she has to wear something pink and purple. I got to keep some of the clothes too!"

Martha is deaf and Rachel has been able to sign for years as both her parents are deaf, and she attends a school which has a unit for a number of deaf children who are integrated into the school.

"I learnt to do sign language when I was very little. It was quite hard at first, but then it got easier," she reveals. "In the end me and the signing teacher had to teach all of the cast how to sign."

As the youngest member of the cast was Rachel seen as the baby on set?

"The other cast members looked after me – I can't really choose a favourite cast member as all of them are my best, best friends. Even the boys are really nice."

What was Rachel's favourite thing about being in a TV show?

"The best thing I'd have to say is getting to meet new people," says Rachel." My favourite storyline would be when I had to do karate. Hadley thinks he's stronger than Martha so I had to learn it and karate chop him!"

Coronation Street Deaf Star Ali Briggs set for Return

Deaf actress Ali Briggs is returning to Corrie, the Daily Mirror Newspaper has reported. Ali first starred in eight episodes playing Emily Bishop's deaf niece Freda.



She left after being upset by Norris Cole who resented the attention she was getting from Emily. Now Coronation Street staff are bringing Freda back on screen in July, along with her fiancé.

A Corrie source said: "Norris struggled to deal with her deafness and this led to some great comedy scenes at Norris's expense.

India's first sign language course for deaf students launched by University of Central Lancashire in New Delhi



03 September 2009 - The International Centre for Sign Languages and Deaf Studies (iSLanDS Centre) at the University of Central Lancashire (UCLan), and its Indian partner, Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU), today launched an unprecedented new sign language programme in New Delhi. The new course will benefit the professional education of deaf students both in India and across the world.

The Indian programme includes a university preparatory "Year Zero" course, which will lead on to the first-ever BA degree in Applied Sign Language Studies. Taught in India, the innovative programme is specifically adapted to the needs of deaf sign language users.

The initial cohort of more than 30 deaf students includes not only Indians, but also people from Uganda, Nepal and China who will all earn both Indian and British qualifications.

Professor Ulrike Zeshan, Director of the iSLanDS Centre at UCLan, said: "Our vision is for deaf students in developing countries to gain professional qualifications at a university level. For the first time, deaf communities will then be able to speak with a voice of authority on matters that concern them, empowering the entire deaf community."

She added: "We are very keen for the BA programme to be international right from the beginning. Therefore, we have provided a number of scholarships for both Indian and international students through the Deaf Empowerment Foundation."

Today's launch function was attended by IGNOU's academic leaders, including the Vice-Chancellor, Professor V. N. Rajasekharan Pillai, who pledged his complete support for an "innovative and truly international programme".

At the launch, the audience watched as the students introduced themselves in sign language, translated by a sign language interpreter. One generous member of the audience, recognising the value of the new programme, declared her intention to sponsor two students for the entire length of the course.

Congratulating the academic heads of the UK-Indian collaboration Professor Zeshan and Professor Ramanujam, the IGNOU Vice-Chancellor added: "I am convinced that this will be a world class programme, from which the whole world will benefit."

Sibaji Panda, the first deaf Indian to study for a PhD in sign language linguistics and course leader for the new programme, said: "In India, most sign language tutors have no formal university qualifications and most teachers in deaf schools do not have any sign language qualifications. To address this, we intend to admit 40 students annually onto the BA course from next year onwards."

The iSLanDS Centre and IGNOU are jointly developing a vision for a Deaf College, where Indian and international deaf students can study a range of undergraduate and postgraduate courses within a sign language environment that is fully accessible for them.

World Deaf Day, Belgium

The event took place on 26th September 2009 and our chair Sabina gave presentation to delegates about Deaf Parenting UK in BSL via video, explaining what we do and how we were set up, as a useful model to be considered for use in their country.

Department Children, Schools and Families British Sign Language pilot project

In June 2008 Andrew Adonis announced that a grant would be made available for organisations to bid to run an innovative pilot project, for up to two years (2009-11), to increase awareness of British Sign Language (BSL) and to up skill the specialist workforce.

This project is a key work strand for the DCSF in helping to narrow the attainment gap between deaf children and their peers.

Other work in this area includes: committing resources to boost the number of teachers enrolling on mandatory qualification courses relating to deafness. from 2009, September including providing funding for additional places.

Project rationale

Following a series of discussions with key stakeholders (including RNID, BDA, NDCS and Royal school for Deaf children Exeter, UCLAN, Merseyside Deaf Society, and Signature) about the importance of BSL and listening to the concerns they had about its status in schools, ministers decided that there was scope to:

- raise awareness of BSL and of deaf culture in general
- raise awareness of BSL amongst the school workforce
- up skill the current specialist workforce
- provide appropriate support to parents who would like their children to learn to communicate using BSL
- ensure the sustainability of the newly up skilled specialist workforce beyond the lifetime of the project.

A Steering Group was assembled drawing together experts, parents, key stakeholders and local authority representatives. Utilising the vast experience of its members the Group developed a specification that invited bidders to develop proposals to look specifically at:

- increasing awareness of BSL and choice for families with deaf children
- increasing demand across the children's workforce to improve their BSL skills and qualifications
- increasing availability of qualified BSL tutors, courses and interpreters demonstrating that the project can be sustained beyond the pilot project's lifetime. (More information can be found http://www.teachernet.gov.uk/wholeschool/sen/datatypes/vihimsi/bslpp/bslfaqs/)



In an extension from the popular Child's Play baby signing resources, the cards cover more advanced vocabulary, including feelings and prepositions.

Using sign language with all children results in increased concentration, improved behaviour and improved spelling and literacy. The use of sign language is becoming more common in nurseries and schools and is even highlighted in the EYFS guidance.



SMS to Emergency Services

Emergency SMS are trialing a service that lets deaf, hard of hearing and speech-impaired people in the UK send an SMS text message to the UK 999 service where it will be passed to the police, ambulance, fire rescue, or coastguard.

Simply by sending an SMS message to 999 you can call for help and the emergency services will be able to reply to you. If this trial service is a success then the service will be launched during 2010.

Registering your mobile phone

You need to register your mobile phone before using the trial emergency SMS service. This is best done **before** you can ask for help.

You can register on their website or by sending an SMS text message from you mobile phone by sending sms text "REGISTER" on 999 and you will receive a reply asking you to accept to be registered with the emergency sms service.
